Membership renewal time is here. The renewal form is posted on our website, and we will have more copies at the May meeting to catch anyone who has not yet renewed.

At the April Board meeting, minor changes to the Bylaws were proposed and are being sent to you for full membership review and approval. Bylaws changes require Board review, posting in the May newsletter, followed by membership vote at the yearly June business meeting. If approved, the changes will be reflected in the upcoming Yearbook publication in fall. Bylaw changes proposed are:

Page 28 (of the 2019 Yearbook)

ARTICLE V

2.B. The Officers shall be elected by a majority vote of Active members present at the Unit Annual Meeting [in June]. 3.A The Unit Chair shall appoint Standing Committee Chairs: Archives Rosemary, Education, Garden Coordinators, Hospitality, Membership, Newsletter, Nominating, Programs, Public Relations, Special Events, and Ways and Means, or any other Committee Chairs to serve with Committees until the next Annual Meeting.[to serve for a period of 2 years.]

These changes are primarily for clarification and do not change Unit policy. We will review at the May meeting, but will not have our membership vote until June.

In other news, we have the need for a new Sensory Garden Co-Chair. Our current Sensory Garden Co-Chairs have been Johnnie Pitts and Marcella Ausmus. Johnnie Pitts served us well but has resigned due to health issues. Johnnie was responsible for some major updates to the Garden, including strengthening the school/garden connection. Marcella and others have been taking up the slack, and we very much appreciate their efforts. However, when the Sensory Garden was first established in 2007-2009, Unit support included a garden maintenance focus and an educational focus, with the educational piece building the relation between the Garden and the school. Doing it ALL has been a difficult, if not impossible, task for one Chair. We want to bring back the old organization and have two separate Chairs, one for the Garden and one for Education. Marcella will be continuing to coordinate support for maintenance of the Sensory Garden, but we are looking for someone to coordinate Sensory Education. Sensory-Education will provide the liaison between school and garden activities. We already have a contact at the school who is willing to work with us. Anyone who thinks they might be interested in interfacing with the school can contact either Henry Flowers or Karen Cornwell.




