
## MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

## October Herb of the Month and Botany Study Group Report Curcuma longa-Turmeric

Botanical Name/Etymology: Curcuma longa

Family Name: Zingiberaceae - Ginger Family

<u>Common Name(s)</u>: Turmeric (English), Haridra (Sanskrit), Haldi, halada (Hindi, Bengali, Gujurati, Marathi)

<u>Origin:</u> Western India (probably) where it has been used for at least 2,500 years, first as a dye, then as spice. It is no longer found in the wild.

Growth Habit: Perennial tropical shrub about 2-3 feet tall, without seeds.

<u>Growth (Cultural) Requirements:</u> Tropical conditions requiring minimal temperatures of about 60 degrees F. These conditions include well-drained, moist soil and high humidity in sun or light shade.

<u>Propagation:</u> Because the plant is sterile, propagation is by pieces of the root (rhizome), with each piece requiring at least one bud as with other members of the ginger family. Commercial growers in India, where 94% of all commercial turmeric is produced, have also recently been experimenting with tissue culture. Harvest of the roots from which turmeric powder, the most common product, is made, can begin after 8-10 months of age in commercial, tropical regions.

<u>Folklore:</u> Turmeric has a long history in India and other Asian countries with religious, cultural and medicinal attributes related to its use as a strong yellow dye and its real or perceived medicinal and physiological properties.

<u>Chemistry:</u> The medically active component of turmeric is curcumin.

<u>Plant Parts Used:</u> The root is used for dye and medicinal purposes; however, leaves may be used as flavoring

<u>Time of Harvest</u>: Being tropical, harvest can occur anytime after the roots reach adequate size, usually 8-10 months of growth.

<u>GRAS? (generally regarded as safe)</u>: Yes; however, because curcumin acts as a blood thinner, it should not be taken in supplement form by anyone taking anti-platelet drugs or other types of blood-thinning medicines, blood-sugar lowering drugs or drugs that reduce stomach acid.

<u>Medicinal Uses:</u> Historically, turmeric was used for a wide range of topical and internal conditions, probably due to what is now known to be its wide antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties, as well as some anti-fungal, anti-viral and anti-bacterial properties. Modern medicine continues to promote curcumin's properties in the same areas, but also is experimenting with

possible uses in more complex diseases such as cancer, diabetes, multiple sclerosis and Alzheimer's.

Scientific literature cautions that while curcumin may show positive effects against the diseases mentioned above in test tubes or lab animal studies, actual use in humans may not have the same effect and that self-dosing for these more serious human conditions should not be attempted or used to replace currently medically approved drugs or treatments.

<u>Other Uses:</u> In Asia, topical application of turmeric is sometimes used to retard hair growth. As previously mentioned, turmeric is an important dye source.

<u>Sources for seed or plants:</u> In areas of the world where there are large populations of southern Asians, fresh turmeric roots are available in Asian food markets. Turmeric does not produce seeds. Growing plants are not usually found at U.S. plant suppliers because of the ready availability of processed turmeric. Mail or internet order would be the most likely source of growing plants.
