

July 26, 2017 PIONEER UNIT BOARD MEETING Held at Festival Hill

Present: Karen Cornwell, Phoebe Lake, Georgia Sowers, Lucy Nehrkorn, Henry Flowers, Lynn Ehler, Cindy Nash, Susan Bame, Kay Robbins, Jane Press.

<u>Programs:</u> Phoebe Lake, Vice Chair Programs, presented a summary of Programs for the coming year.

<u>Membership</u>: Georgia Sowers, Vice Chair Membership, reported new active member Patty Mills and new affiliate member Patricia Hoffmaster. Sue Edmundson and Lois Sutton have renewed as affiliate members. Affiliate members Susan Wittig Albert and Cindy Rollins elected not to renew membership.

<u>Motion</u>: Upon a motion duly made and seconded, the Board voted unanimously to ratify the new active member and the status of the affiliate members.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Lucy Nehrkorn, Treasurer, distributed copies of the PU Quarterly Income Statement and PU Budget Summary Report for 3 Months Ending June 30, 2017. Checking account balance is \$63,340.37.

It was agreed that the Education budget would be increased to \$1,000.00 with \$300.00 each going to the Botany Group and Culinary Group; the Festival Hill budget would be increased to \$3,500.00; the Sensory Garden budget would be increased to \$700.00; and the Storage Unit budget increased to \$725.00.

<u>Motion</u>: Upon a motion duly made and seconded, the Board voted unanimously to approve the Treasurer's Report with changes noted.

Standing Committee Reports

Archives and Rosemary - Lynn Ehler said all is good with Rosemary and Archives.

Scholarships – Kay Robbins reported that Henry Flowers and Phoebe Lake received Unit scholarships of \$150.00 each, Henry for a Botany program and Phoebe for a Biblical Herbs program. A \$2,000.00 scholarship was awarded to Randa G. Homann, a student at Texas A&M University.

Gardens – Henry Flowers reported Festival Hill is in maintenance mode and can always use more volunteers on Tuesdays. Susan Bame reported the Sensory Garden is doing well and she would like to have a group take turns watering.

Communications – Cindy Nash reported questions from members regarding how to get into the magazine.

Plant Sale/Gazebo – Karen Cornwell advised that Diana Reed has agreed to co-chair with her on the Plant Sale.

<u>Motion</u>: Upon a motion duly made and seconded, the Board voted unanimously to approve Diana Reed to co-chair the Plant Sale with Karen Cornwell.

Thyme Well Spent Shoppe – Jane Press reported that TWSS is looking for a Hospitality committee chair. Henry advised that Georgetta Welch will take over the labels that Henry normally handles.

New Business

Karen Cornwell, Chair, wants to promote the practice of appointing co-chairs for Unit positions as they need filling. Past Chair Henry will review applications and renewal forms to gather information.

The Herb Society of America, Pioneer Unit Botany Study Group Data Sheet

Botanical Name/Etymology: Tamarindus indica

Family Name: Fabaceae

Common Name: Tamarind, Indian date

Origin: tropical Africa - -now widespread throughout the tropics.

Growth Habit: Evergreen tree 80 to 100 feet tall (long-lived) with thick gray bark and strong branches. Leaves are pinnate 4-6 inches long, fernlike, and feathery. May drop their leaves if exposed to drought conditions. Trees bear fruit as early as 4th

year; however, depending on conditions, may not bear fruit for 10-14 years and will bear fruit for 50-60 years before productivity declines. Flowers are yellow with pink streaks and resemble small orchids. Seed pods grow on new branches. Pods start off green and change to brown. When ripe, the pods house kidney-shaped seeds surrounded by a sticky sweet pulp -- nature's way of attracting animals to spread the seeds.

Growth Requirements: Light, well-drained soil in sun. Hardiness 59-64 degrees F.

Propagation: seed or cuttings in moist rich soil in tropical conditions

History: References to tamarind trees in Hindu mythology. Arabs and Persians were most likely first exposed to tamarind, also called Indian date. Tamarind was used by the Greeks as early as 4th century.

Plant Parts Used: Fruits

Harvest: When seeds are brown and dried on branches

Culinary Uses: Dried fruits act as a souring agent, like lemon juice, in curries, fish dishes, chutneys, sauces (e.g. Worcestershire sauce). Thai cooking and sweet and sour dishes. Candy. Immature pods are eaten fresh, pickled, or added to soups, stews, and sauces. Used as a beverage in Mexico and Costa Rica.

Medicinal Uses: Internally for fevers, asthma, and nausea in pregnancy. Externally for sore eyes, ulcers, and rheumatism. Combined with Senna in laxatives.

Other Uses: South Asian craftsmen produce furniture, tools, boats and dyes from the wood.
