Report on Herb Society of America Annual Meeting of Members and Education Convention

The 2019 Herb Society of America Annual Meeting of Members and Education Convention was held in downtown Madison, Wisconsin, on June 13-15 at the Best Western Park Hotel. The hotel is located right across the street from the beautiful Wisconsin state capitol building, which I thankfully had a bit of free time to tour. This building is the central focus of the city, which reminded me of Austin – young and vibrant in its energy, rich with its history, active with a major university – University of Wisconsin – Madison and full of wonderful restaurants and things to do. The capitol building sits on an isthmus of land between two good-sized lakes: Lake Mendota to the west and Lake Monona to the east, both easily accessible by walking.

The first day of the meeting started with a tour that first went to the University of Wisconsin – Madison Arboretum. While there we saw a multitude of trees and shrubs that have been collected in order to study hardiness (most of the area around Madison is in USDA zones 4-5), variety and as a germplasm repository. There were large collections of crabapples, lilacs, conifers, Ginkgoes, and much, much more. The tour was led by the curator of the arboretum, David Stevens, who is the husband of Jane Hawley Stevens, owner of Four Elements Organic Herbals, a great source of hand-made salves, lotions, tinctures, and such. I met Jane about a year and a half ago when she was an herbalist in residence at the American Botanical Council in Austin and came to visit Festival Hill.

The next stop on the tour was Olbrich Botanical Gardens, situated on the scenic north end of Lake Monona. This garden is supported by the City of Madison and is thus open free to the public. It has many beautiful thematic gardens, and we were given a tour of the herb garden by the curator of that garden and a tour of some interesting gravel and prairie-style gardens by the director of the gardens. A box lunch followed those tours and after that we had time to tour the rest of the gardens on our own. The sunken garden and rose gardens were also interesting and an authentic Thai pavilion was perhaps my favorite destination. A quick nap in a comfy chair in the shade surrounded by some friends doing the same was a great way to enjoy the peace of the gardens.

Next stop on the tour was Klein's Greenhouses, a family-run business that is now being managed by a third generation with a fourth in supporting roles. Since I was flying home I managed to avoid finding any plants to take home, but did find a nice river stone, engraved with one of Madalene's favorite sayings, to add some ballast to my suitcase!

After a brief stopover back at the hotel we were off again, this time on school buses, to a reception at the Centennial Garden on the campus of the University of Wisconsin - Madison. This lovely, student-run garden surrounds a historic building on the campus and has a variety of well-labeled plantings. Lots of giant alliums and catmint were in bloom, providing a sea of my favorite color. A reception tent was set up on a central lawn and all the attendees had a great time. I saw lots of long-time HSA friends and got to have some nice chats with many of them.

The next day the conference started in earnest. The Annual Meeting of Members was held first, with reports from the President and Treasurer and an election of new board members – most notably a new Treasurer and a new Membership Chair – Dianne Duperier, a member of the Southeast Texas Unit. I have a copy of the 2019 Annual Report and would be glad to share it with anyone who is interested; just let me know.

Following were a series of wonderful lectures – Lower Maintenance Garden Design, Moon Gardening, The Lore of Spices, and Growing at Risk Medicinal Herbs.

In the midst of those lectures was the Rosemary Circle and Golden Sage Recognition Luncheon. Because the Pioneer Unit is now 25 years old a couple of our longest term members, Euphanel Goad and Kay Von Minden, were inducted into the Rosemary Circle. Congratulations Euphanel and Kay!!! Neither was able to make it to the meeting to be given their rosemary pins there, but hopefully by now they have received them in the mail. We should do something in our unit to provide some recognition as well!

The last meetings of the day were district meetings. Our South Central District meeting was led by our district delegate Bill Varney. There were about 12 or so members in attendance with the following units represented: South Texas, Ozark, Southeast Texas, Hill Country, Texas Thyme and our own Pioneer Unit with Madeline Johnson, Sara Holland and myself in attendance. A few of the items discussed were plans for the South Central District Gathering at the Ozark Folk Center on October 3-5. This will surely be a great event and if you plan to attend I urge you to make your room reservations at the Folk Center soon. You can do that and register for the Herb Harvest Fall Festival on the Ozark Folk Center website or by calling them directly. I've been to the event many times and it, as well as the center itself, is wonderful and highly recommended.

The South Central District fund is in good shape, and the Pioneer Unit continues to donate to that cause every year.

The last event of the day was the Awards Dinner. Two award winners were honored this year. Jo Sellers of the Potomac Unit was awarded the Helen de Conway Little Medal of Honor and Gayle Engels of the American Botanical Council was awarded the first Madalene Hill Award for Excellence in Herbal Education. I nominated Gayle for this award and was honored to sit at her table along with friends Billi Parus, Susan Belsinger, Tina Marie Wilcox, Pat Kenny, Holly Shimizu, Pat Crocker, and Deni Bown. Gayle's acceptance speech was very moving. I'm sure that Madalene is proud that Gayle was given this first award!

The next day started early with a walk through the Dane County Farmers' Market – the largest outdoor farmers market in the US! Luckily it takes place on the sidewalk around the capitol building, so we just had to step across the street and we were in a little piece of paradise. Hundreds of vendors were selling herbs, vegetables, meats, nuts, flowers, pastries, jams and jellies, honey, local cheeses (something Wisconsin is known for and rightfully proud of) and so much more. I was on the hunt for some gooseberries, but sadly it was still a bit early for them. I did manage to buy and bring home some fresh rhubarb and a large bag of shelled hickory nut. Some ginger and chocolate scones and a small basket of fresh strawberries made it back to the hotel, but were gone before packing to leave. This was a fabulous start to the day.

The first meeting of the day for me was the Unit Chair Meeting. Because our Unit Chair, Karen Cornwell, was unable to attend the meeting, I sat in on this meeting. It was quite interesting. Many units in many areas have similar problems – especially an aging and declining membership. Knowing that our unit is growing and has many very active new members I felt good about our status. I believe we are really blessed because we do have many great members who are interested in bringing friends into the group and also because of our location in that many of our members have retired to the area and they are being active in retirement and want to participate and learn. Some units have had to resort to having both night and day meetings and some switch between the two seasonally. Night meetings have helped to bring in younger members who can't make day meetings because of job responsibilities. In a modern age where so much information is available online it can be hard to recruit younger members. I certainly agree that the internet is a great resource, but that in no way can compare to being with and learning from others in person. An intriguing idea to get all members involved in a Unit was to have every one of them either be on the board in a position or involved in some manner in a committee. Perhaps that is something we could implement as we have many committees and many hands make light work.

More presentations by Pat Crocker, Susan Belisnger (HSA Honorary President) and former President Debbie Boutelier followed. We even went on a virtual herbal cruise of the Mediterranean with a local landscape designer who has a passion for herbs. The last event of the day was an interesting pairing of teas and cheeses. Wonderful samples were provided, and it was a really fun end to the day. Afterwards I found out that while we were inside enjoying lectures we missed seeing a rally of naked bicyclists going around town. That would have been an interesting sight! Perhaps they have those in our state capital as well.

To cap the day off I went with some friends to a local pub, and we had a very jolly meal in a snug (you'll have to look it up). Afterwards we all said our goodbyes as some, including myself, were leaving to head home the following day.

I did manage to squeeze a few other things into my trip. A visit to the National Mustard Museum in Middleton, a town nearby to Madison, was a must, even though I'm not horribly fond of mustard. While there we sampled many mustards, toured the fascinating museum downstairs, and purchased a few jars to bring home (further adding ballast to my already stuffed suitcase). Because I flew in and out of Milwaukee I had some time there too. Billi Parus and I visited a fabulous group of greenhouses (domes) that were beautifully planted with a varying array of plant materials. After that we had to pick Gayle Engels up at the airport and with a bit of time stopped at a local ice cream parlor for some of the best ice cream I've had. We both had chocolate, but were urged by a local afficianado of the establishment to get a sample of the butter pecan (there interestingly pronounced "pee-cun"), which was divine, but unfortunately the new batch wasn't quite ready. After picking Gayle up we went to see the Boerner Botanical Gardens. While there we saw masses of peonies and irises in bloom and I got to sit on a bench and commune with a nearby lilac in full bloom until we were chased inside by a quick but heavy rainstorm. After that we were back to the airport to pick up Deni Bown and then were on our way to Madison, arriving about midnight.

The HSA meeting next year will be a one-day Annual Meeting of Members which will be held on April 17th in Charleston. It would certainly be a good excuse to visit that wonderful city, so put it on your calendar now if you are even slightly interested as it will certainly be a wonderful meeting. I urge you to attend if you can as it is a great way to meet others from across the country who share a similar passion for herbs.
