

Pleasing Plant Profile

Mexican Bauhinia, Mexican Orchard Tree Bauhinia Mexicana

Consisting of over 500 species, the genus Bauhinia was named after Gaspard and Jean Bauhin. These two Swiss brothers worked on an organized method of classifying plants in the 1500s, long before Linnaeus. The species epithet refers to its native Mexico.

Interestingly, all bauhinias have symmetrical leaves. When you fold them together, they "match." A fun activity for the youngsters in your life!

My Mexican Bauhinia was a gift from a friend many years ago, which makes a plant even more special. An easy, free form shrub for the filtered shade, it can grow to 8 feet or more. Because it's deciduous, winter is an ideal time for trimming back. Most winters I prune mine hard as it's in a rather restricted space and can grow quite wide. Mother Nature is prone to hard pruning some winters, but the Bauhinia comes back even denser the following spring. A bonus is that oftentimes you can find seedlings at the base of the shrub, and you can pass them on to friends, giving another special plant a home!

Delicate white blooms appear in early summer and cover the entire shrub. These flowers attract butterflies and hummingbirds. As if that weren't enough, the Mexican Bauhinia is deer resistant!

HERB SOCIETY OF AMERICA

The HSA herb of the month is peppermint. With any luck, you have some in your garden and can make this simple syrup to use in Summer recipes:

Mint Simple Syrup Mint

Simple syrup can be used to sweeten and flavor hot or iced teas, lemonades and cocktails. Create your own unique blend of herbs to create a signature beverage!

2 cups water

2 cups of sugar

6-8 sprigs of fresh peppermint (3-4 inches long, no need to remove from the stems)

1 tablespoon of lemon, lime or orange zest (optional)

In a small pot, bring the sugar and water to a boil. Simmer until the sugar is dissolved, about 3 minutes, and remove from the heat. Add the mint sprigs and citrus zest, cover and steep for 30 minutes. Strain and chill. Will keep in the refrigerator for up to 1 month.


