February 17 – Random Acts of Kindness Day


February 20 – World Day of Social Justice

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# MARCH 2021 PLANT SALE for MEMBERS, FRIENDS, AND FAMILY

The annual plant sale will be here before we know it! The plant sale committee explored options for taking the plant sale to the web, but going virtual turned out to be an expensive, unwieldy option.

It is still important to keep everyone safe and healthy in the pandemic. This year's plant sale will be different in many aspects. For example, in-person browsing and shopping will not be allowed. Shoppers will complete and return an order form. Orders will be picked up Thursday March 18, Friday March 19, and Saturday March 20 via a drive-through on Festival Hill grounds.

There will not be the profusion of plant varieties and Thyme Well Spent Shoppe (TWSS) gift items the sale is famous for. The 2021 sale will have herbs, tomatoes, peppers, and twenty different TWSS items.

There will not be roses, landscape annuals, shrubs, trees or a Gazebo with hypertufa potted succulents. But we still have 5,000 plants to sell.

General information and the pre-order form will be mailed to members during the first week of February. The form will also be posted on the Pioneer Unit website.

Please copy and share the order form with your friends and family. We are encouraging all members to set a personal goal for the sale of 50 plants each.

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## HORTICULTURAL STUDY GROUP The Promiscuous Basil

Tucker and Debaggio in <u>The Big Book of Herbs</u> used the above phase in talking about basil. Why? Well, basils are notorious cross-pollinators. Apparently, they never met a basil that they didn't like. So those seeds you save from your Genovese Basil may or may not be Genovese next year, if you had other basils nearby. The species *Ocimum basilicum*, which we lovingly call sweet basil, has spawned dozens of cultivars, including Purple Ruffles, Lettuce Leaf, Siam Queen, and Mexican Spice. So you can see from this short list that we have benefitted greatly from basil's promiscuous tendencies. The Horticulture Study Group will be studying basil in 2021. Each group member will be growing at least six types. Although we haven't finalized the list yet, the contenders include Sweet Genovese, Sweet Dani, Spicy Globe, Thai, Wild Magic, Cardinal, and Kapur. We will try to keep our basils from being too promiscuous, but then again -- where's the fun in that?
