Hello!



# FROM THE PROGRAMS CHAIR


I don't know why we wished 2020 away: 2021 hasn't been so great either! But I hope you are able to remain grateful for many things, as I am.

Brent had a wonderful Power Point presentation depicting the variety of areas and beautiful grounds of the new Botanic Garden. The Garden is 132 acres, located on the former Golfcrest Country Club, near Hobby Airport. Some of the highlights were a picnic grove and a creative play place for kids. Brent stated that 90% of the plants are already used in the Houston area and 10% are experimental. There are areas for teaching and guiding one on research, conservation, education, discovery, and just plain enjoyment and serenity. 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### CULINARY GROUP

The Culinary Group met via Zoom on February 3. We are skipping March and will meet virtually on April 7 with a program on Chilies presented by Debi Thomas. Anyone interested in signing up for this Zoom meeting can contact me via email, and I'll send you an invitation.

Our February program was on two members of the Apiaceae family, caraway and celery. Here are a couple of factoids:

Caraway 'seeds' are actually the caraway fruit called achenes (a' kens).

Caraway has been found to be highly effective for heartburn.

As to celery, the wild celery grows over 3 feet tall and is cultivated for the seed.

Celery is also a powerful allergen, and Europe requires a warning on products that have been processed in a facility that also processes celery.

Here's a recipe for Celery Soup that was given a 4.9 star rating on the web site 'feastingathome':

Celery Soup

2 tablespoons olive oil
1 onion diced
4 large garlic cloves, roughly chopped
6 cups thinly sliced celery (a large head)
2 cups peeled potatoes
4 cups chicken or vegetable broth
1 cup water
1 bay leaf
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
½ teaspoon cayenne (optional)
¼ cup chopped dill, small stems okay
¼ cup sour cream



Sauté onion in olive oil until golden, then add remaining ingredients up to fresh herbs. Bring to a boil, lower heat, and simmer until potatoes are tender. Add fresh herbs and heat only until wilted. Remove bay leaf. Take off heat and blend with an immersion blender until smooth. If using a regular blender, process in batches never more than half full, cover blender with a dish towel, and use low speed. When soup is smooth, stir in sour cream, yogurt or cream.
