Monarchs are heavy pollinators, but are considered by some conservationists as nearing endangered status in the United States.

Lauren is planning on sharing some native seeds with us and will share other resources as well.

I was vacationing in early September and missed our meeting. I understand there was another great presentation. I want to give a big shout out to Cammie Beierle for stepping in for me as the Membership Chair while I was gone. Thanks, Cammie!! Thirty-six members attended the meeting. Two guests also attended – Andrea Riebeling (as Cammie's guest) and Jana Lefebvre (as Phoebe Lake's guest).

Teaching What you Know – Learning Something New – Everybody Earns Volunteer Hours

On September 20th, Jane Press demonstrated how to make pear mincement. Along with 5 other attendees, we learned how to prepare the pears and the mincemeat concoction, prepare the jars, cook the mincemeat, pour just the right amount into the jars, and make sure it was all done correctly so the mincemeat stayed safe. We made approximately 48 jars that will be sold at the upcoming Herbal Forum next March. It was a delightful way to spend a Fall morning. I can't begin to describe the aroma that was in the kitchen that morning. All I can say is "Yummmmm." This was my first foray into learning how to can. I've never done it before. In addition to learning a new skill, we each received 2 hours of volunteer time because we made the mincement to be sold at the Forum (Jane probably earned at least 5 or 6 hours for her prep work and teaching). What a wonderful way to earn volunteer hours!! I encourage each of you to consider teaching a skill that you are knowledgeable about (needlework, making jellies, making lotions or soap, etc.) to other members. If the items you teach and make are then contributed to sell at the Forum, you've earned yourself some volunteer hours and a lovely day. Talk to Pat Cox if you have an idea for a class you would like to teach.

Collecting Seeds

Speaking about the Forum – now that it is Fall and our herbs and plants are turning flowers into seeds, please collect those seeds. We need them to sell in the Thyme Well Spent Shoppe. This past March, we had 200 seed packets to sell. We sold out the first day. You can start bringing your seed collections to the Unit meetings. Give them to Diana Sellers or Cathy Nitsch. We ask that you remove any of the debris that surrounds the seeds and just give us the seeds. Package each group of seeds in a different container – paper sack, ziplock bag, plastic jar – and label them. Collecting seeds and preparing them to be used in the sale is another excellent way to earn volunteer hours.


PHARMACY GARDEN
