#### MINUTES OF UNIT MEETING HERB SOCIETY OF AMERICA PIONEER UNIT February 9, 2023

Kathe Forrest, Chair, welcomed members to the February meeting.

Ellis Unit to teach them about herbs – growing them, culinary uses, and use in soaps and other products. The program was well received by members, and there was interest in taking a field trip to tour the herb gardens. Mr. Langley will attend our March Forum with an ex-inmate who has gone through the program and now runs his own business. There may also be an opportunity to purchase herbs for future Plant Sales from the program at a lower cost.

Kathe thanked the speaker and lunch hostesses Cindy Nash, Susan Bame, Diana Reed, Caroll Edwards, and Pat Cox. She reminded members that the position of Secretary is vacant and anyone interested should contact her or Linda Rowlett.

# HORTICULTURE STUDY GROUP

Planting Time! The Horticulture Study Group received eight mints to grow: Chocolate Mint, Strawberry Mint, Orange Mint, Mojito Mint, Kentucky Colonel Spearmint, Ricola Swiss Peppermint, Moroccan Mint, and Red-Stemmed Apple Mint.

Red-Stemmed Apple Mint is also known as Doublemint 'Madalene Hill'. It is unique in that it contains both spearmint and peppermint oils. It is said that this mint gives you the most 'minty' flavor by combining the sweetness of spearmint with the menthol kick of peppermint.

In addition to getting to know the 8 varieties, the group also talked about pot irrigation. Once again Royceanna Kendall and Tom Solis shared their expertise. Madeline Johnson had provided a sample of a drip irrigation system for pots that uses an emitter tube. Royceanna and Tom showed how the spot spitter can be used in pots.

In addition to their mints, each participant received eight pots and enough potting mix to fill all their pots. Once the mints are planted, participants will begin to measure the mints' height, width, sun exposure, and soil moisture.

Phoebe Lake spoke about the challenges manufacturers face as the environmental aspects of depleting Canadian peat bogs become apparent. As a substitute, our mix contains HydraFiber, a patented product made from pine trees that results in a light, fibrous material.

Our next meeting will be March 23 from 10 -noon in Building #9 at Festival Hill. Henry Flowers and Madeline Johnson will talk about mint cultivation.
