At times, we find beauty and resilience in the strangest of places. Walking around New Ulm, I discovered this cassia plant growing out of a parking lot by the old fire station. In this long, hot and dry summer, this plant which normally prefers moist and rich soil is thriving and surviving. Cassia is also known as Chinese cinnamon, and the bark can be harvested and ground for baking. I hope to harvest some seed pods this fall and try this plant in my yard, and maybe preserve some seeds for our sale in March.

Our speaker for October will be Lisa Whittlesey, the coordinator of the International Junior Master Gardener Program and a creator of award-winning curricula to inspire children to get outside and involved with gardening. 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HORTICULTURE STUDY GROUP

Using Mint in Crafts, Personal Care Products, and Pesticides

Tory Farley, Royceanna Kendall, and Patty Mills presented the program on non-culinary and non-medicinal uses of mint. Tory began the presentation by listing some of the crafts that can be made using mint, such as candles, bath soaks, and lip balm. Tory distributed a homemade soap containing mint (recipe below). Royceanna followed by explaining how peppermint spray can ward off mice and other unwelcome guests in your home. A simple spray containing peppermint essential oil will do the trick. Patty provided the special treat of homemade buttermints made from our homegrown mints. Each of us took home a bar of mint soap made by Tory and a vial of Immunity Boost Deodorant made by Royceanna.





Tory's Simple Mint Soap

Shea butter soap base 1-2 tablespoons chopped fresh mint 6-10 drops of peppermint essential oil Soap mold.

Melt the shea butter soap base in 30 second intervals in the microwave until it is liquified. Use a microwave safe container, like a glass Pyrex measuring cup, that makes it easy to mix and pour. Stir after every 30 second interval to help everything melt evenly.




