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MINUTES OF UNIT MEETING HERB SOCIETY OF AMERICA PIONEER UNIT October 12, 2023

Kathe Forrest, Chair, opened the meeting held at Brenham Presbyterian Church, Brenham, Texas. Tess Hartman, Vice Chair Programs, introduced the speaker, Lisa Whittlesey, Extension Program Specialist and Coordinator of International Junior Master Gardener Program, Texas A&M Extension Service. The program, "Getting Children Outside and in the Garden," included audience participation in singing a song about the parts of a plant to the Adam's Family theme song and making an Insect Aspirator or "Bug Sucker" to collect small insects from plants.

After the program, Kathe passed around a sign-up sheet for the Sensory Garden on October 20 and 27 to show kindergarten children around the garden. Kathe then gave a summary of the Board Meeting held Monday, October 9, 2023. The Unit will no longer lease the non-airconditioned storage unit, and the contents will be stored at Festival Hill. The Unit will pay Festival Hill for storage which will be less cost than the current storage unit. Additionally, the items will be on site when needed for the Plant Sale in March. Tess will be looking for a facility in La Grange to hold a Unit meeting. The Board discussed the scholarship money available, because we do not have many people signing up for the scholarship funds. It was suggested that the Unit can offer a \$10,000 scholarship at Texas A&M or plant a garden at a nursing home. Repairs will be made to the three broken slats at the bridge at the Sensory Garden. A lengthy discussion ensued regarding a "Volunteer Survey," and a form was made and has been put out on the tables today. Kathe asked that everyone fill out the form and put their name on the form. The Pioneer Unit has signed up with Festival Hill to care for the Pharmacy Garden. Members can work on other gardens, but our main focus is to care for the Pharmacy Garden. A Volunteer Coordinator is needed to reach out to members, to call or talk in person to members to encourage them and to inform them of volunteer opportunities. Next June will be the transition for new board members. At the November meeting Kathe will have a list of the positions and the responsibilities of each position. Kathe reminded everyone once more to fill out the Volunteer Survey form and turn it in to her.

Diana Sellers, Membership Chair, announced we had 32 members present and four visitors: Terri Russell, Leslie Conrads, Kim Keeter, and Melissa Houck. Wendy Matthews has joined as an affiliate member because she lives in Austin. Diana announced she has the 2023/2024 membership cards and Membership Directory. There is a default password for signing onto the Herb Society website to the left on the membership card. Diana passed out a membership pin to Sandra Brown for 15 years.

Kathe informed the members that Pat Cox has workshops and trips planned for the future.

Patty Mills, Hospitality Chair, has a sign-up sheet for the Thanksgiving meal for next month. The herbal blend group, also known as "The Strippers," will meet next Thursday at Patty's home. HORTICULTURE STUDY GROUP

Restoring Mints Through Fall Pruning

Phoebe Lake demonstrated how to prune your mints. Since mints are vigorous growers, most frequently grown in pots, and can go dormant in the winter, Fall is the best time to prepare them for spring growth. In addition, you have dried mint leaves to use during the Winter months. Pruning is the first step but the next step is equally important. Mints can become tangled up in their own roots. The solution is to cut through the roots using a serrated knife in a grid pattern. To form the grid pattern, start by cutting lines spaced about 3-4" apart in one direction. Then turn your pot and start cutting lines that cross the first set of lines. The last step is to add compost to the top soil, covering your grid, and water well. Your mints are ready for the next season.
