MINUTES OF UNIT MEETING HERB SOCIETY OF AMERICA PIONEER UNIT

February 8, 2024

The Unit meeting was held at St. John's United Church of Christ, Burton, Texas. Kathe Forrest, Chair, asked for a moment of silence for Becky Nichols and her family in the loss of her husband, Nick, and for Madeline Johnson and her family in the loss of her husband, Wes. Tess Hartman, Vice Chair Programs, introduced Ramin Baranpourian, Greenhouse Manager of the Temple of Compassion in Burton, who spoke on "Ayurvedic Medicine and Herbs."

Kathe reported that the health of Mary Reeves, a member of HSA for 50 years and soon to turn 90 years old, has stabilized and she is back at home. Kathe asked for a vote to dedicate this year's Forum to Mary Reeves. All members voted in favor of the dedication. Kathe asked all members to take Forum and Plant Sale posters and flyers and distribute them wherever possible. As of last week, 28 have signed-up for the Forum. The workday Unit meeting will be March 7 in the Service Building at Festival Hill. Julie Johnson, Jana Rinehart, and Irene Spurrier need more volunteers to sign-up for the Plant Sale. Julie said the shifts are divided between before lunch and after lunch. If a member plans to work the whole day, she should sign up for the before and after lunch shifts. Julie still needs more sponsors for some of the beds in the Pharmacy Garden, and there will be a monthly clean-up day on the first Tuesday of the month. Courtney Kieke asked how to get plants for the Pharmacy beds. Kathe said to let her know what plants are needed so the Unit can order the plants along with the plants ordered for the Plant Sale.

Kathe informed the members that Friday volunteers at the Plant Sale will have to arrange for their own lunch. There will be snacks provided in the room next to the Thyme Well Spent Shop. Saturday volunteers can sign-up for the lunch prepared by Festival Hill. At this time, she does not know if the lunch will be free or if volunteers will have to pay.

Cathy Nitsch thanked everyone who dried mints for teas and all those who have made jams, jellies, and marmalades. She reminded members they can be reimbursed for the cost of jars and ingredients. Cathy also has jars for those who need them and is willing to deliver jars to your home. She also thanked all members who have signed-up to help in the TWSS. Members who make jams, etc. are to let her know what is made, and she will make sure the labels are printed and available to apply to the jars on the March 7th workday.

Kathe passed around a jar of honey for members to taste and vote on whether they liked it or not. The honey was infused with yarrow and lavender, and all members liked it. It will be sold at the TWSS. Kathe also asked if someone would make beeswax wraps for sale. Patty Mills and Joanna Hagler volunteered to make them. Kathe has some toothpicks made from tea tree if anyone is interested in trying them.

Diana Sellers, Membership Chair, announced 38 members attended and seven guests: Dawn Wilson, Jason Beierle, Marian Dider, Kim Taylor, Kathlene Marken, and Catherine O'Brien and Julie Forbes from the South Texas Unit. HORTICULTURE STUDY GROUP

The first meeting of the Horticulture Study Group was held February 22nd at Phoebe Lake's home. Phoebe explained the process of propagating rosemary from cuttings, and then we went to work. First, we cut three stems from Barbecue Rosemary provided by Phoebe. We stripped the lower leaves, dipped the stems in rooting hormone, made a pencil hole in the moist soil, inserted the stems (3 to a pot), and gently pressed the dirt around each stem. Why three? Well, it seems that cuttings like company. The final step was creating a personal hothouse for each pot by placing plastic over top of the pot and securing it with a rubber band. This keeps the cuttings moist so that roots develop. The 'plastic tent' has to be vented periodically to prevent too much moisture from building up and leading to a fungus infection.

Did you know that rosemary is part of the salvia genus? Genetic testing of this plant revealed that it is not a separate genus. It's good news for rosemary, which was very lonely in its very small Rosmarinus genus. It keeps a part of its name as it is known as Salvia Rosmarinus.

VOLUNTEERS AT WORK

Noreen Barker took the photos on this page and the next, and Julia Johnson sent them for the newsletter with the following information:

The Beethoven Woods are getting a face lift, and mulch will be coming soon. We identified many interesting plants there, like the variegated and non-variegated alstromerias coming up in large masses and a small group of Ledebouria petiolata which are spotted with heart shaped leaves. We moved a loquat to be better protected from naughty things like mowers!

Across from the Pharmacy Garden, in the Fruit Tree and Butterfly Garden, we identified many surviving species of pomegranate, pineapple guava, bay laurel, medlar, Mexican plum, and flowering quince. This area has been cleared of excess branches and weeds and is awaiting further restoration.

This past Saturday Ann and Eric Wilson, Henry Flowers, and I worked on the Ann's Arbor area. We pulled weeds and trimmed back perennials and shaped shrubs and roses. On Monday, we unloaded over a ton of mulch in this area alone! Henry has also had the paths of the Pharmacy garden sprayed. It is all looking very nice, and I'm looking forward to the Forum and Plant Sale.

In unpacking while moving into our new digs at 116 Medical Parkway, Schulenburg, Texas 78956, I came across a photo of the Mary Garden. I took it in March 1996. I think that our members would be interested in seeing it. Kay and I were visiting Festival Hill while building on the property we had in Round Top. We met Madalene Hill and learned of the first Herb Festival. as the Herbal Forum was first known. She said the garden had been spiffed up for it. Note the fig ivy hadn't yet been introduced; the beds had wooden landscape timber framing; there were no upright plantings; and the drain in front of the Mary statue hadn't covered amond changes to come in the future. But it still looked good. The photo was taken from the top of the pedestal's overlook.
