

To find Track It Forward, go to the Internet and type in Track It Forward; click on the Track It Forward link. When the webpage comes up, sign in with your email address and your password, then click on Log In. Your email address is the one you have listed with the Pioneer Unit. If you don't remember your password, click on "Find It Here" which is next to the question "Can't Remember Your Password." Create a new password. Start entering your volunteer time. You can also download the TIF app on your phone and enter your hours through your phone. The preference is for everyone to enter their own hours, but if you need some help, you can also send me the dates and times that you volunteered, and I will enter them for you. Most important is I want to be sure that we capture all the hours that everyone volunteered.
