**Membership Renewal Time is Here:** The Membership Renewal process has started. Five members submitted renewals in April. About 15 members have already renewed on line. Good start! The due date to submit renewals is May, and it would be super great if we could finish this process quickly. Why do we start this process in May? The Pioneer Unit's year is July 1 through June 30. The Herb Society of America requires units to submit their membership forms and dues by July 1st, so by the beginning of June, units start compiling their reports. We submit them to HSA by the end of June, along with a check. Lots of steps!

You have three options for renewing, and all 3 are acceptable:

- **Renew Online** submit the renewal form and money online. Ann Lugg has the online form ready to go. The form can be found behind the Forms tab on the Pioneer Unit website (https://www.herbsocietypioneer.org).
- Mail to Pioneer Unit PO Box print and complete the renewal form; mail it and your check to the Pioneer Unit, P.O. Box 223, Round Top, Texas 78954.
- **Turn in at the May (preferrable) or June Meeting** print and complete the renewal form. Give it and a check to Diana Sellers during the meeting.

Make checks payable to HSA Pioneer Unit. If you have any questions regarding this process, please contact Diana Sellers at 512-461-7175 (text or call) or you can email me at <u>sellers2000@yahoo.com</u>. Whether you choose the category of **Active** member or **Affiliate** member, the total dues are still \$67 (single) or \$98 (joint), unless you are an Active member of another unit. Then you only pay the \$12 to be an Affiliate member of our unit.

**Volunteer Hours:** Capturing each person's volunteer hours is important because it shows us what it takes to run the Pioneer Unit, so don't forget to enter your hours in Track It Forward. If you need some help, you can also send me the dates and times that you volunteered, and I will enter the information for you. ## MINUTES OF UNIT MEETING HERB SOCIETY OF AMERICA PIONEER UNIT APRIL 11, 2024

The Unit meeting was held at St. John's United Church of Christ, Burton, Texas. Tess Hartman, Vice Chair Programs, introduced Kathe Forrest, our Unit's Chair, who presented the program "Homeopathy for the Garden known as Agrohomeopathy."

Kathe then introduced Debi Thomas, Treasurer, who presented a preliminary report on the March plant and TWSS sale. The profit is approximately \$30,000, about \$10,000 more than 2023. There are still expenses to be recorded.

Julie Johnson needs help sorting the plant sale labels. She suggested it could be done after the meeting today, or members could meet after the May meeting. About 30 students from Round Top came to Festival Hill and Julie Johnson, Courtney Kieke, and their husbands, Chris and David, showed the students the gardens. After the tour, the students helped them put out mulch in the gardens. Round Top Family Library (RTFL) is hosting garden classes this summer for 3rd – 6th graders. There will be two classes a week between 2:30 – 5:00 p.m. Julie has volunteered for June, but volunteers are needed for July. If anyone would like to help, contact Kelia at the RTFL for more information.

Jana Rinehart said it was a great Plant Sale, fun, and Julie did a great job. The Pottery Shed did well and the new location by the cashiers made the Pottery Shed more visible for the customers.

Cathy Nitsch announced there are items left from the TWSS that are offered for half-price at today's meeting. Cathy highlighted the beautiful cards Julie Johnson made that are for sale for only \$4.00. Cathy thanked all those who worked in the shop and stated everyone had a fun time.

Kathe informed the members that there will be a board meeting on April 17th. One item on the agenda is to discuss having the plant sale just one day with or without lectures or to continue holding it for two days, as in the past, with the lectures on Saturday. Kathe needs to let Lamar Lentz at Festival Hill know today about the dates and herb of the 2025 year which is chamomile. Most members would like to continue as we have been in the past. Belinda Weatherly thinks it would be nice to have more data such as: are Friday sales more than Saturday and does the Unit need the money? Tom Solis thinks the Plant Sale should continue as it is because it is a great way to attract new members and hopefully younger members with more energy. Jana pointed out that people who come annually would be disappointed if it were held for one day. Tess Hartman pointed out that the LaGrange paper had an article on our Plant Sale that was quite entertaining and positive. Cathy Nitsch pointed out that everyone works hard for this fundraising event, but the Unit is not spending the money. The money should be spent on scholarships or other projects and not just sitting in the bank. Kathe then asked for suggestions on how to spend the money the Unit has. Someone asked if the Unit is still supporting the project at Prairie View A&M. One of the guests suggested sponsoring a program at Brookwood.

Cathy Kietlinski does most of the work at the Sensory Garden, but Brenham Elementary staff is not very receptive to allowing the students more education time in the gardens. Julie and Debi Meschwitz both pointed out that the schools have their schedules already made out for the school year and do not have time to include the Sensory Garden. Belinda pointed out she is a Master Naturalist and this group found out things work well if you can get the school schedule, work around the schedule, and do all the work. Kathe suggested working with the Round Top school.

Kathe passed around a sign-up sheet for the New Ulm Bee Festival on May 4, at 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. She wants to continue to do things at the area libraries to bring in new members.

Ann Lugg said we may be able to cut our advertising expenses by cultivating a relationship with Jay White at <u>Texas Gardner</u> magazine. Jay has a lot of followers on Instagram and if the Unit's plant sale could be mentioned there, we could get a lot more coverage. Tom Solis suggested an article in the Round Top newspaper and Round Top magazines.

Diana Sellers, Membership Chair, announced 41 members attended and six guests: Kim Taylor, Kathleen Marken, Serena Speaker, Toni Kirkpatrick, Deb Miller, and Sandy Pillion. Diana next showed items left at the Plant Sale and TWSS, hoping to find the owners present at today's meeting. She reminded members that membership renewal dues are due. Ann Lugg will have the Pioneer Unit website set-up to accept renewal dues by Monday. Diana has sent out an email on how to record volunteer hours on the "Tract-it-Forward" website.

Next month's meeting will be at Festival Hill. Caroline Riley with be the speaker. She is an herbalist from Austin who spoke at the 2023 Forum. Due to the limited kitchen space, Patty Mills, Hospitality, suggested everyone bring items that do not need refrigeration or heating, such as picnic dishes. We may eat outside if the weather cooperates. Today's hostess team is Cammie Beierle, Bonnie Lout, Pat Cox, Carroll Edwards, Jo Ann Reichle, Debi Meschwitz, and Connie Gwen. ## HORTICULTURE STUDY GROUP


At the April meeting of the Horticulture Study Group, we learned about harvesting and storing rosemary. Julie Johnson, Courtney Kieke, and Martha Neva provided us with new and old ideas on how to store rosemary. (See photo.) Drying is probably the best way, but freezing rosemary in water makes adding it to a summer drink very easy. (See photo.) Freezing rosemary in butter with a mix of other herbs is easy to add to soups and other dishes.

The nine varieties of rosemary that we are growing this year are planted and growing slowly. A couple of our growers lost their Foresteri Rosemary to unknown causes. Sometimes, a plant when it arrives from a nursery is already weak. Nevertheless, we still have plenty of Foresteri rosemary growing. Overall, the plants are healthy.
